Joseph Kemno (1853-1928) was a Lake City freighter and laborer who constructed this single-story log cabin late in his life. The cabin is located at the rear of lots adjacent to the alley in Block 72, its front-facing gable extended for a porch overhang. A side-gable addition of milled logs was constructed to the south in 1954 by Hugh and Esther Keltner.

Joe Kemno arrived in Lake City in the 1880s to work on the railroad grade between Lake City and Sapinero. He later was a well known freighter hauling ore from the Golden Fleece and Ute-Ulay Mines. According to his obituary in 1928, Kemno also drove wagons over the old toll road leading from Lake City to Wagon Wheel Gap and Del Norte. Kemno owned unimproved property at this location between 1913 and 1915, and was assessed for horses, harness, and wagons.

He was assessed for improvements valued at \$10 beginning in 1917. Following Kemno's death in 1928, the cabin was inherited by his great niece, Lorna Wolf, a professional dancer from Kansas City, Missouri. According to the Lake City correspondent in the Gunnison NEWS-CHAMPION, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Wolf, and daughter, Lorna "have fixed up the Kemno cabin and expect to spend time there." The Wolfs sold the property to another Kansas City couple, Hugh and Esther Keltner, in 1946. The Keltners' added the 1954 log addition to what they christened "Uncle Joe's Cabin." Mrs. Keltner died in the cabin in 1979, after which it was inherited by her nephew, William Davis.

43.	This residence is associated with the growth and development of recreation and tourism in Lake City from around 1915 through the 1960s, following the local decline of hard rock mining. Although built in 1917, it became a summer home in 1928 and continues that purpose today. It also reflects the re-use of late 1800s and early 1900s dwellings as summer homes. The shed located at the rear of the lot near the alley is representative of the outbuildings constructed in Lake City in the late 1800s and early 1900s as reflected in its alley location, frame construction and wood siding. Assessment of historic physical integrity to significance:
	The architectural integrity of this dwelling is intact, as evidenced by minimal alterations to its character-defining features.
