One-story, two pen building of squared logs with slightly pitched front-gabled roof. Exposed purlins in east gable end. Roof of corrugated metal. Swing-out garage doors of framed vertical boards in east elevation. Shallow shed-roofed, frame section on rear now serving as a wood shed. Log foundation. Entrance at rear of south elevation has paneled door.

35. Historical background:

According to local historic tradition, the Nelson Garage at 121B Gunnison is the oldest surviving structure within the Town of Lake City. The late Jean McCloughan Vickers, who served as Hinsdale County Clerk for over 20 years, identified this as Lake City's sole surviving 1874 structure.

The original cabin had a flat, dirt roof, and is identified as such on the Oct. 1902 Sanborn Insurance Map of the Town of Lake City. Later modifications include a rear addition of logs which have been left in the round; newer, round logs have been added to the top of the walls and gable front in order to replace the flat roof with a slightly gabled roof with exposed rafters. The other significant alteration to the historic structure is the addition of a pair of outward swinging wooden garage doors which were installed c. 1950. Portions of logs near the corner on the south wall show evidence of being partially burned, a reminder of the June, 1909, fire which burned two adjoining residences to the north.

Historic documentation at 121B Gunnison is scant. Historic photos, the earliest probably taken in fall, 1876, confirm a cluster of dirt-roofed shanties which existed at this site. Tax records provide little information on a potential original owner for the cabin. The lot on which it is located remained under ownership of the Lake City Town Company in January, 1876. By 1877 it was assessed to George Smeaton and Albert Greenfield with a valuation of \$200 for the land and \$100 for improvements. In later years the lot was assessed without indication of an improvement, perhaps indicative of the cabin's slight value. As a remodeled garage, the cabin is now an outbuilding associated with the Worrell-Nelson Cabin, 121B Gunnison.

42. Statement of significance:

This house is associated with settlement and development of Lake City during the late 1800s mining era. It is a somewhat altered representative of the pioneer cabins constructed in Lake City during this period, as reflected in its squared log materials and lack of architectural details. It is believed to be one of the three original cabins built by town founders in 1874 and to be the oldest extant building in Lake City.

The addition of garage doors to convert the pioneer cabin for auto storage reflects the local tradition of re-using mining-era buildings and building materials during the 1915 - 1960s rise of recreation and tourism in Lake City.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity to significance:

Although somewhat altered by addition of the garage doors, this dwelling retains its architectural integrity as seen its size, shape, roof form, and hewn log materials.

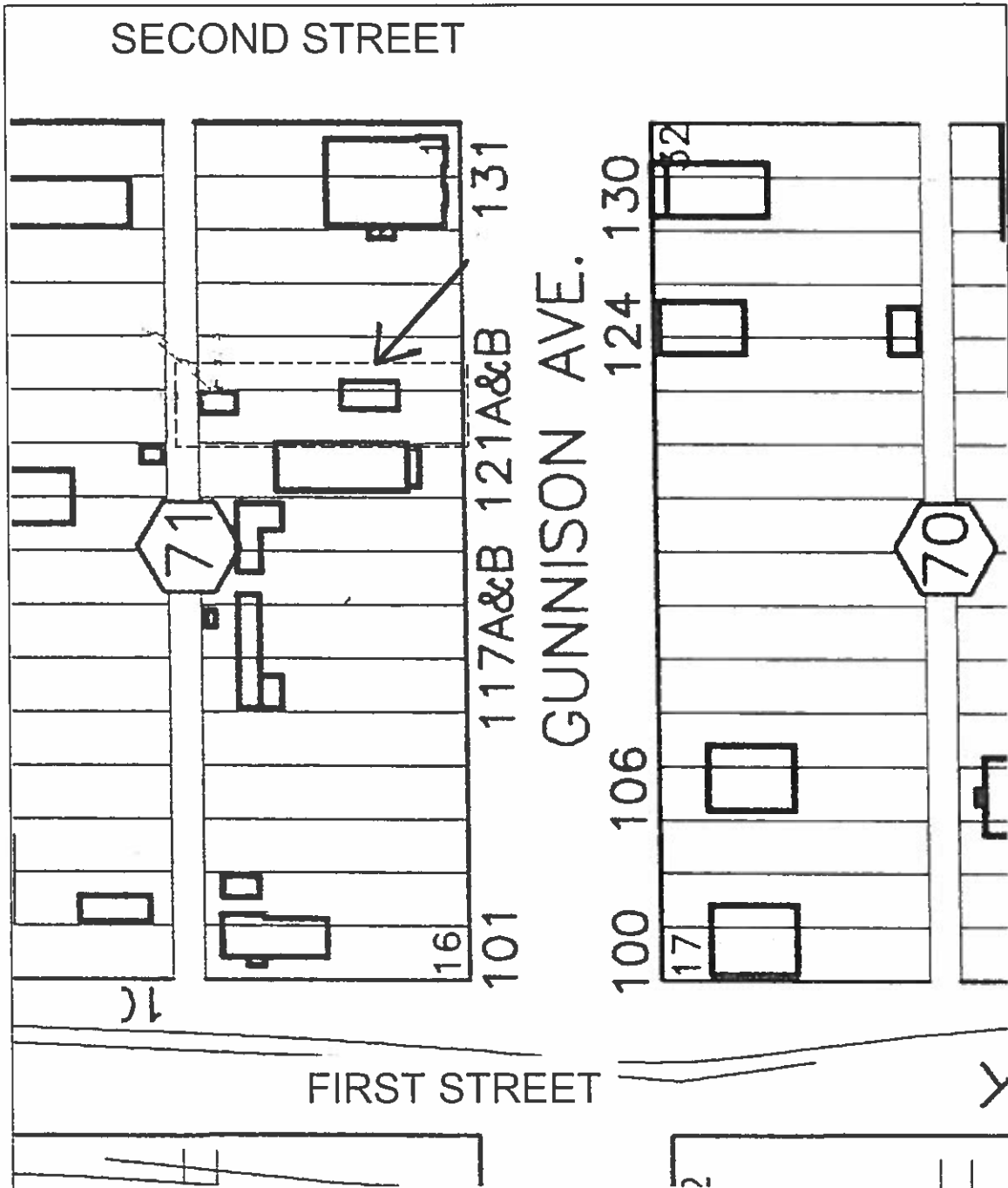
