Small, one-story, hipped-roof dwelling of rock-faced cinder block. Metal roof with exposed rafter ends. East elevation has off-center entrance with 4-lite, paneled door and small gable above entry. Windows are 6-lite with wood sills and functional shutters. Circa 2000 rear addition is hipped, with lower walls of rock-faced cinder block and upper walls of horizontal wood siding. Entrance has paneled and glazed door with gable above. No visible foundation.

- 35. Historical background:

Following demolition of the 1-1/2-story Titus House and failure of a planned town plaza park in 1931, 217 Gunnison remained vacant until 1947 when Joel F. Swank constructed this one-story cinder block residence. The gabled roof has exposed rafter ends and features a non-symmetrical front with front window and doorway, the latter sheltered by a pedimented, non-supported porch overhang.

As a contractor, Joel Swank's local building career began with log at the neighboring Town Square Cabins (219-231 Gunnison) in the 1930s and evolved to his trademark cinder block buildings starting in the 1940s and continuing through the 1950s with the Lone Pine Motel (230 Gunnison), together with side or rear additions to the Lake City Drug Building (307 Silver) and Avery Store (300 Third). Later in his building career, Swank switched to concrete block and simulated log (231 Henson) in the 1950s.

Swank's formula for cinder block construction involved three main ingredients: water and 50-cent bags of cement, together with a binder in the form of cinders which were gathered along the railroad right-of-way on Henson Street. Water, cement and cinders were mixed and poured into a 48-block metal mold. After curing 24 hours, the blocks were removed from the mold and the process repeated. Swank employed Freeman Warren "Bud" Stall, a former miner at the New Golconda Mine, to manufacture the blocks at a plant he set up in the old Pasttimes Building (125 Silver).

217 Silver was constructed at the time of the marriage of Joel Swank and Celia Mae (Rawson) Ewart, and the newlyweds lived in the home for the first two years of their marriage. The home at that time consisted of two bedrooms, and living room/kitchen. Unlike many Lake City homes of the era, it had interior plumbing utilizing a well on the property. The Swanks later rented the property, seasonal residents including Oklahomans Karl and Gladys Albert who bought the house in 1960. Other renters of the house were William Burke, and Pat and Jake Jacobs. According to the Alberts' son, J.L. Albert, his parents purchased price the house for \$2,500 and were given the opportunity to acquire the neighboring McClellan House (217 Gunnison) for an additional \$2,500. J.L. Albert sold the property to the current owner, Willis Mackey, in 1992.

	This dwelling is an excellent example of the use of rock-faced concrete block materials. It is individually eligible for nomination to the National Register under the Multiple Property Submission for Ornamental Concrete Block Buildings in Colorado, 1900 to 1940. The house was constructed by local businessman and builder Joel F. Swank. Swank also operated the Lake City Hotel during the 1930s and 1940s, constructed the adjacent Town Square Cabins, and built the Lone Pine Motel on the opposite side of Gunnison Avenue.
