It was enlarged with the north addition and covered in clapboards at an early date, together with a long, narrow boardwalk leading to an alley privy, no longer extant, all of which is visible in an 1877 overview photograph of Lake City.


Tax record research of the property indicates it was owned by a variety of owners in the 19th Century, including John S. Hough who may have used it for investment property or perhaps employee housing for one of his local enterprises. The original owner of the house was James Gebert, who located the Hidden Treasure Mine and was a partner in the pioneer sawmill firm Gebert & Hall. Gebert was assessed taxes for ownership of the house in 1879.

Twentieth-century owners of Gebert-Wheeler were Thomas Halpin, a well known prospector who, among other mines, worked the famous Golden Fleece Mine at Lake San Cristobal, pioneer freighters Frank Wheeler and Clint Buskirk, and, up to 1995, Ed and Mildred Cromwell. It is now a rental property owned by the local business consortium Sorrel Top, LLC. A rear addition for additional bedroom and bath as completed in 1996; back buildings include a metal two-door garage building, dating from the 1960s, and several contiguous wooden storage sheds dating to the early 20th century.
