- 35. Historical background:

The Sullivan-Cummings Cabin is a single-story, front-gable log home built in the rustic style with a shed roof front porch. The cabin is a second generation building at this site and amply illustrates the architectural evolution as late 19th Century buildings were replaced by seasonal buildings by out-of-state residents, primarily Oklahoma and Texas, who were intent on spending a portion of the summer in Lake City. Building materials remained in short supply in the post-Depression, World War II economy, and in this instance a building crew was brought in from Guymon, Oklahoma, utilizing locally milled logs.

The original house at this site dated from the late 1870s and was contemporary with the surrounding neighborhood of small and mid-size frame residences occupied by local businessmen. The original two-story board and batten structure burned in a late April, 1946, fire which also destroyed two other 19th Century frame residences to the immediate south.

The original house was owned by Texas residents R.E. and Bessie Anthony at the time of the fire, and the following year they sold the vacant lots to two businessmen from Guymon, Oklahoma, W.J. Sullivan and Homer Dixon. Four carpenters were brought in from Guymon on what was termed a "rush job" constructing the single-story duplex cabin. The cabin and lots were acquired by Sullivan's nephew, Grady Ernest Cummings, and two other Stratford, Texas, businessmen, C.C. Plunk and A.C. Pittman, in 1959, and the property remains in the Cummings family as of 2003. Ernest Cummings and his wife, Nola, began vacationing in Lake City in 1938, first staying for a couple weeks each summer at one of Blackburn's Holiday Inn cabins in Wade's Addition.


They wished to expand the length and frequency of their visits, however, and acquired the Sullivan cabin for this purpose. Even prior to implementing modern irrigation techniques at their Stratford farm, the Cummings were able to visit Lake City as many as three times each summer. Between 1938 and Mr. Cummings' death in 1998, the couple missed coming to Lake City only two years during World War II because they were unable to obtain automobile tires or gasoline. As an example of summer residents' dedication to spending summers in Lake City, fourth generation members of the Cummings family spend a portion of each year in their "Pride of the Plains" cabin which the family has owned for nearly 50 years.
