1-1/2 story and one-story, gabled frame dwelling. Wood-shingled roof with brick chimney in south roof ridge. Walls clad in clapboards and trimmed in cornerboards and friezeboard. Prominent two-story bay window in east gable wall has 1-over-1 windows with colored glass in upper panes, elaborate decorative shingling, a flared mansard roof, decorative brackets, and elaborate roof cresting. Gabled dormer in south roof slope. Most windows are 2-over-2 double hungs with pedimented window hoods. Hipped-roof section on south elevation contains small porch accessed by a wood walkway. Porch shelters the front entrance that consists of a paneled and glazed door with colored glass. Porch has paired stick supports and decorative trim. Gabled and shed-roofed sections/additions on the rear have a second entrance with a paneled and glazed

Historical background: Businessman Peter P. Kennedy (1834-1904) is responsible for this home which, architecturally, represents a succession of building styles and mirrors Kennedy's economic standing in the community. A native of Ohio, Kennedy came to Lake City in 1876 by way of Illinois and Kansas. He was a shoemaker by trade and in 1885 acquired Samuel Wendell's Miners Boot & Shoe Store on Silver Street. He also acquired Wendell's shares in the virtually worthless Golden Fleece Mine at Lake San Cristobal which unexpectedly boomed in the 1890s and made Kennedy a wealthy man. The Kennedy home started out as a relatively spare Greek Revival style, 1-1/2-story front-gabled frame house built in 1882 in an area which was then outside the Town of Lake City. It later entered the town when West Lake Addition was absorbed into the town boundaries. With the Golden Fleece Mine making rich strikes, Kennedy began to materially expand the home in 1891 with Queen Anne-style elements. including a two-story bay window with stained and frosted glass which partially obscured the front gable facing the street. These materials reflect greater availability of materials due to 1889 completion of railroad. A large two-story addition was also completed to the rear of the original house, the Lake City TIMES noting in June, 1892, the result "is as handsome as any in Lake City." Known as one of the town's finest residences, the Kennedy home grew to contain 13 rooms, including music room, library, and formal study. Following the death of his wife, Mildred, in 1898, Kennedy sold the residence to Charles and Belle Sweet. As an indication of Lake City's economy following the collapse of mining, the once fine residence passed to Miners & Merchants Bank and was owned by the bank until acquired by Lee and Ruth Williams in 1919. The home's current owners, Tom and Midge Murphy, completed a thorough renovation of the home in the 1980s


